## **BUILDING A SCENE: PERSONAL NARRATIVE - GUIDELINES**

Writing Workshop #1

To demonstrate your mastery of *Writing Workshop #1*, you will complete the "Building a Scene: Personal Narrative." You will recreate an important conversation in your life. You will use the components of a scene (dialogue, speaker tags, descr. speaker tags, snapshots, thoughtshots) to establish setting, characterization, conflict, and mood. For this writing task, utilize ALL materials from Writing Workshop #1.

## WHAT DO YOU NEED IN YOUR SCENE?

1. 10 lines MINIMUM of dialogue

\*\*Note: Introductory and closing lines (e.g. "Hey!" and "Bye!") are not included as these should not be utilized within your scene.

- 2. 4 speaker tags MINIMUM using variations of said
  - All "said" variations must be different.
  - All "said" variations should reflect the emotions of the speakers.
- 3. 2 descriptive speaker tags MINIMUM
  - 1 descriptive speaker tag MINIMUM using a traditional adverb
  - 1 descriptive speaker tag MINIMUM using a prepositional phrase
- 4. 14 snapshots MINIMUM
  - 7 snapshots MINIMUM that reference the setting throughout the scene
  - 7 snapshots MINIMUM that reference character movements/actions throughout the scene
  - Within your snapshots, you must utilize 3 out of the 5 senses.
  - Your snapshots should "paint the picture" for your readers.
- 5. 3 thoughtshots MINIMUM
  - Your thoughtshots can include internal dialogue.
  - Consider potential flashbacks and/or background info that could be included.
- 6. 3 "show, don't tell" examples of character emotion
  - These should be snapshots and/or thoughtshots that REVEAL character emotion.
  - These examples are IN ADDITION to your snapshots and thoughtshots.

## IN ADDITION...

- Your scene should adhere to the conventions of punctuating dialogue.
- Your scene should be told from the FIRST PERSON point of view.
- Your scene should be written in the PRESENT TENSE.
- Your scene should <u>immediately</u> bring the reader into an important moment (meaning, no "background info" paragraph / introductory paragraph at the start)
  \*\*Tip: Try starting your dialogue scene immediately with a line of dialogue!
